A Chinese seal is usually used as a stamp to print a person's name on paper to represent one's signature. Some seals may also include personal motto or a sentence from a poem.



Match the characters of the seal to the correct description.



Tan Chor Lam's name seal



Tan Chor Lam's personal seal with the Chinese characters "Jie Ai Guo Yuan" (meaning "cultivating a love for our country") Red characters known as *zhuwen* (朱文) in Chinese are formed by carefully removing the stone around the characters.

White characters known as *baiwen* (白文) in Chinese are created by carving the characters directly from the stone.

There were many well-known Chinese calligraphers in history such as Wang Xizhi. He used to practise Chinese calligraphy near a pond and would wash his brush there. Over time, the pond turned black with ink. What does this tell you about him? What value(s) do you think is required to master Chinese calligraphy?



Imagine you are a Chinese calligrapher, complete this Chinese character using the "Four Treasures of the Study". Otherwise, you may join the dotted lines below and colour the word.

The word is *fu* (福) which means good luck in Chinese. It is traditionally written on red paper and used as spring couplets to decorate one's home during Lunar New Year.
